OPENING REMARKS

- Africa should have no business talking about unemployment as a developing continent because there is so much work of developments to be done
- Unemployment/ employment is more a dependent (outcome) variable rather than an independent variable (causes)

Hence, to address it, focus should be on independent variables (causes).



I. GOOD GOVERNANCE

- Ensure the right macro- economic policies:
 - promote export- oriented industries based on comparative and competitive advantages;
 - reduce dependency on importation of finished goods that can be produced locally;
 - promote backward integration and forward integration



Good Governance (Cont'd)

- Investment in infrastructure:
 - economic infrastructure like roads, rails, seaports;
 - social infrastructure;
 - health infrastructure
- Eliminate corruption
 - Corruption has accounted for underdevelopment in Africa
- Promote sustainable enterprises through constructive social dialogue.



Good Governance (Cont'd)

- Eradicate barriers to sub-regional trade.
- Investment in sub-regional road networks and rail system
- Make land border crossing more efficient and effective.



II. POLITICAL AND SOCIAL STABILITY

Reduce political upheavals

Minimize tribal social tension Eliminate industrial disharmony as a result of illegal strikes and picketing.



III. IMMIGRATION POLICY

• Principally, African jobs should first and foremost be for Africans except where the skills and competence are not available.



IV. EDUCATION REFORM

- Market-driven
- Functionality rather than literacy.
- Technical and vocational Skills oriented.



V. ROBUST LABOUR MARKET INFORMATION SYSTEM

Skills and competences required in the economy.

- Current job vacancies
- Economic performances of sectors and projection into the future



VI. IMPERATIVE FOR A STRONG SUB-REGIONAL SOCIAL PARTNERSHIP

- A strong sub-regional BMO that is tradefocused.
- A strong bi-lateral sub-regional relationship between Labour and Employers to drive socio-economic development.

 - Identification of Private Sector's idle capacity for Technical and Vocational training.
 - Utilization of idle capacity.

ITF-NECA Technical Skills Development Project (TSDP): A PPP initiative

- Establishment of Skills Centres in collaboration with the Government.
- Improvement of infrastructure in formal Technical Schools.
- A new approach: Sectoral Skills Intervention Programme
